- **Sectional Directors (4 – NW, NE, SW, SE)***
*(Directors term of office: three years. Duties include: conduct the business of the Association; assist in the establishment of policy for the Association; approve the annual budget; appoint an Executive Director, Regional Chair, Treasurer, Newsletter Editor, and Membership Coordinator; and interpretation of the Constitution and By-Laws.)

Appointed Positions:

- **Executive Director**
(Term of office: two years. Past/present service to the IAMLE Board or knowledge of IAMLE mission and focus required. Current duties include: coordinate the operation of the Association; chairperson of Elections Committee; represent the Association as directed; coordinate summer camp; recruit and secure corporate sponsors; and serve as ex-officio member of the Board of Directors and the Executive Council, without voting rights.)
- **Conference Chair**
(Term of office: three years. Are You Highly Qualified?

One of the most significant provisions of the No Child Left Behind (NCLB) legislation impacts teacher licensure and certification requirements for new and veteran teachers alike. Although this provision could have far reaching effects on current teacher practitioners in Iowa's K-12 schools, teachers of middle level students should pay particular attention to certification guidelines; specifically, the Highly Objective Uniform State Standards of Evaluation (HOUSSE) guidelines currently under consideration by the Department of Education. These HOUSSE guidelines give states the flexibility to determine "Highly Qualified" in addition to the NCLB requirements prescribed by law.

What are those requirements? Let's examine them. NCLB legislation established certification requirements for all teachers of core subjects effective 2002-03 for beginning teachers and effective the 2005-06 school year for veteran teachers. Teachers of core subjects must pass a state's teacher licensing examination or have full state teacher certification and have demonstrated competence in each subject they teach. At the heart of the demonstrated competence requirement of NCLB is the mandate that teachers possess a major, hour equivalent to a major, a graduate degree or national board certification in each subject taught. The core subjects identified in the legislation included: reading, language arts, math, science, foreign language, civics and government, economics, art, history, and geography.

For teachers of middle grades students and for special education teachers, especially those in self-



contained settings, these hour-equivalent or major requirements seem impossible to achieve. Fortunately, Iowa teachers will benefit from the Iowa Quality Teacher Act provisions, specifically, the Iowa Teaching Standards, that serve as a major compliance vehicle to the

"Highly Qualified" provision of NCLB. Iowa's HOUSSE provisions, as they currently exist, can be found on the Iowa Department of Education website at www.state.ia.us/educate/ecese/nclb/doc/annualletter.html.

These basic requirements, required of all teachers, include:

- admission to a teacher education program in Iowa following an acceptable score on a basic skills entrance examination,
- demonstrated proficiency on multiple assessments on content knowledge, professional knowledge, and pedagogy (currently completed by each teacher preparation institution),
- completion of an academic major or coursework equivalent to a major for each additional teaching assignment, and
- recommended by the college and completion of a background check.

Further, beginning teachers, effective now, must:

- complete a two-year successful sequential mentoring and induction program based on the Iowa Teaching Standards,
- complete a comprehensive evaluation on the Iowa Teaching Standards, and
- be recommended for a standard license following demonstrated competence as determined by the comprehensive evaluation.

Veteran, or career, teachers must:

- by July 1, 2005, begin evaluation on the Iowa Teaching Standards and demonstrate competence through performance evaluations conducted at least once every three years,
- by July 1, 2005, develop an individual career development plan aligned with the district's long-range student learning goals and the Iowa Teaching Standards, and
- each district must include a career development plan in their comprehensive school improvement plan (CSIP) and filed with the Iowa Department of Education.

For middle level teachers, completion of your middle level endorsement will not only help you achieve "Highly Qualified" certification requirements but will also help you to meet the conditions of the career development plans required by July 1, 2005. In fact, Iowa's Quality Teacher Act does more than help you jump through the hoops of meeting the demands of NCLB. It clearly identifies not only the importance of content knowledge, but supports the premise forwarded by the National Middle School Association that equally important are the knowledge and skills to teach those subjects effectively to students you serve...in our case, the young adolescent.

2005-06 is just around the corner. What plans have you made towards an individual career development plan? How will you begin to show implementation of best practices that produce improved student achievement in your classes and schools? What part will implementation of middle level best practices play in your CSIP planning? Take a moment to reflect on your training and the requirements soon to be in place. Are you "Highly Qualified?"

UNI Waste Reduction Workshop Targets Middle School Teachers

Waste Reduction: Addressing the Overlooked "R," a one-hour University of Northern Iowa graduate credit course, will be held in Grinnell on Friday evening, January 23, Saturday, January 24, and Saturday morning, April 17. The workshop costs \$50 per teacher.

Participants will receive: 1) A bibliography of resources for reading in content areas; 2) Free resources—valued at more than \$75—that are directly applicable to cross-curricular and thematic units; 3) Modeling of activities that lead to science inquiry; 4) Classroom-ready lesson ideas that incorporate research-proven instructional strategies; 5) Correlations to national standards; 6) One hour of graduate credit, meals and refreshments.

This year, the focus will be interdisciplinary and aimed at middle school educators in English language arts, social studies, science, math, art, music and Talented and Gifted subject areas. Teachers from a variety of fields have taken the course and used the materials in classrooms with success. Meggan Boyle, 8th grade Language Art teacher at Brody Middle School in Des Moines, took the course in spring, 2003 and says, "This was my first attempt at a cross-curricular unit, and I believe it was important to the objectives of my teaching, classroom and school. I was able to reach more students, and incorporate more interests, by expanding my curriculum into another field. I would not hesitate to use the unit again."

Approximately 15 grants will be awarded to classrooms that present the best service-learning project ideas. Students are encouraged to work with their teachers to identify service-learning ideas, apply for the grants and report on their projects.

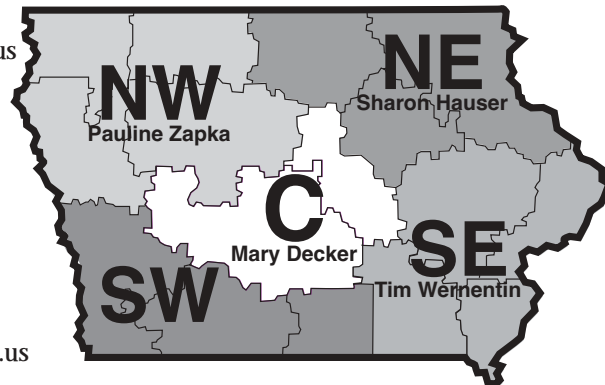
